





### Don't believe everything you read in the papers!

From the Parochial Church Council:

Few can fail to have noticed the media spotlight falling on St. Mary's over the last month. It has not always been an easy situation, and often a very painful one. Just to clarify the situation. The Church Commissioners are a body which has a legal obligation to manage the investments of the Church of England. They support bishops and cathedrals, they help to pay pensions of clergy. They give no funds to the local church, and indeed, the local church has to contribute significant funds to the central coffers of the Diocese to pay for vicars in parishes. On top of all that, the local church has to find ways to maintain, heat, light, and insure places like St. Mary's. No financial support is given to us for this from any central funds.

But when protests are voiced at the actions of the Church Commissioners, as has happened very publicly recently, there is no visual image for the media cameras of The Church Commissioners'. It therefore becomes a sort of 'visual shorthand' to point the camera at the local church, as if we have been involved in the actions of the Commissioners. Nothing could be further from the truth. When protesters declare they are withdrawing their support from the church, it is the local church, caught in the crossfire of a battle they didn't make, from whom they are withdrawing.

Our vicar, Amanda, has been horrified to see headlines purporting to be quotes from her, which are words she had never spoken. We have all been disturbed by the suggestion that there has been a mass exodus from St. Mary's church. It is simply not true. If anything, we have been aware of folk coming along to show solidarity with St. Mary's, and for this we thank God, and those who want to show their support.

We are deeply aware of the hurt and pain of the community because we are carrying it too. And it is the role of the church to seek to bring about what healing and resolution might be possible. Much of the heartache has been through a lack of dialogue and real listening. We hope that over the months and, indeed, years, which will follow, opportunities will be made for dialogue to happen. St. Mary's church wants to facilitate this.

Taking a mediatorial role is never easy. You feel tugged and pulled in two directions, standing in the middle. But when we look at the cross of Jesus, it is a symbol of that – stretched out, building a bridge of reconciliation. The church can do no less.

enough money to pay for our new building program. The bad news is, it's still out there in your pockets."

### **One Solitary Life**

In the two thousand years since Jesus walked the narrow streets of Nazareth, his life, character, and teaching have dominated the world. Of course there are other people who have had a profound influence in a particular area, but none have had so widespread an influence, on anything like the scale, that Jesus has. There are Christians everywhere. Wherever the message of Jesus has been proclaimed, people of all sorts of tribes, cultures, backgrounds, and intellects have turned from their own ancestral beliefs, ways, and traditions to follow him.

That's truly astonishing, because it has meant ostracism, often self-sacrifice, and sometimes martyrdom, but even that has not stopped people falling under the spell of Jesus, but why?

Because, after all, he was born the illegitimate son of a carpenter, he was raised in an obscure little village in a far flung corner of the Roman Empire. He didn't go to college, he was never made a priest, he never held any official office. His ministry only lasted for three years, ending in his being crucified by the Romans for sedition, at his death his following only numbered about 120. And yet that one solitary life has caused more change on this planet than any monarch, conqueror, general, or political system in history.

There are those who think that Jesus was just a "good man", but if Jesus was just a "good man" what is it that has caused the effects of his life and teaching to be on a totally different scale to every other good or great person who ever lived?

To begin with, his teaching was very different, the early evangelists tell us that Jesus taught "as one who had authority". His teaching turned traditional Jewish religious teaching upside-down. So where did this teaching come from, how is it that he got all this learning without ever being to any of the colleges of his day?

How is it that no teaching, about how people should behave towards each other, has emerged in the last two thousand years which is any advance on Jesus, the carpenter from Nazareth? What was there in his heredity, and his environment, to account for such a unique teacher, and to account for the remarkable fact that no greater one has ever looked like emerging?

Well Jesus himself gives us the answer in John's Gospel 7:16 "My teaching is not mine, but his that sent me." Well could he be right? Did he come from God? Could that account at one fell swoop for his authority, his depth, his simplicity, his world wide appeal in every age. Jesus was on a different scale to every other teacher. He not only taught the highest standards of conduct that any teacher has ever formulated, but, here's the difference with Jesus, he also kept them himself, he lived and he died by them.

As we read the Gospels we might be struck by a remarkable contrast. On the one hand Jesus is a humble, self forgetting figure, healing the sick, teaching the people, offering hope, befriending the outcast.

He is no typical Rabbi, no academic, no theologian, but a horny-handed carpenter, whose words are full of hard headed wisdom, and earthy illustrations. He has no money, no settled home, no vote, no rights.

Yet on the other hand he makes the most fantastic claims, for instance, he takes it for granted that he is entitled to man's worship, the worship normally due to God alone, no "good man" would do that. He also forgives people's sins, now what are we to make of that? The Pharisees knew very well what to make of it. "Who is this that forgives sins?" they asked "there is only one who can forgive sins and that is God." And that is precisely the point, Jesus was laying claim to do what God does, Jesus is claiming to be God, and no "good man" would do that

No, in Jesus we meet some one who is very, very different, he is not merely a good man", that is the one thing he cannot be. Jesus does not present himself to us as the best example of the human race, he is on a different scale altogether. He comes to us from beyond the human race, as God himself.

To paraphrase C S Lewis -----

You must make your choice -- Either Jesus was and is the son of God: or else a madman or something far worse. You can call him a fool, you can spit at him and kill him as a demon -- or you can fall at his feet and call him Lord and God. "But don't come with any patronising nonsense about his being a great human teacher.

He has not left that option open to us. -- He did not intend to.

The people at St Mary's who donated a wide and colourful selection of toys and games for boys and girls of all ages during our annual toy appeal have been thanked for their generosity by Tony Daniel's the Salvation Army's Divisional Director of Community Service.

For it was to the Salvation Army that we turned for help when we suddenly discovered – after the Nativity Service on December  $11^{\text{th}}$  – that our usual channel for distributing the toy collection was no longer open to us.

Normally we take the toys to the Morley Observer to help swell the outcome of their annual Toy Appeal. But this year we discovered that not only had the Morley Observer closed its main street office but that it was no longer operating its Toy Appeal.

Thankfully the Salvation Army was able – and delighted - to fill the breach. The delighted Divisional Director said some of the toys would find homes among needy families being helped at the Army's family residential centre at Mount Cross, Bramley and others would be distributed in nearby towns, especially in Morley and Batley, by other officers.

Mr Daniel's said that Wayne Duffy and Tracey Harrison, officers in charge at the respective Batley and Morley churches, were well aware of families in the area who were suffering from high levels of deprivation and who would really appreciate the gifts of toys at Christmas time.


