





The joys of scaffolding.

As I write we are experiencing church services in half of the building whilst the other half is full of scaffolding.

It was thought wise to get this pressing work done to repair the ailing cornice before the wedding season begins – I'm not aware of many brides (or grooms, come to that) who have a particular desire for scaffolding to be part of the backdrop to their big day! (And, since the 'bride's side of the church' is completely taken over with scaffolding, it would add its own complications to the church seating arrangements).

Time after time, our experience has been that when major challenges happen to change our usual way of doing church, far from being a handicap, it has been very good for us.

We certainly felt that way when we had to decamp to the Parish Centre for church services for several months some 4 years ago when the ceiling and floor in church were replaced. It was good for us, bringing us closer together. It was our prayer that this might also be an experience which enriches us.

And last Sunday it did. We sat closer to one another, and it generated an atmosphere of warmth and friendship. Conversations were struck up which might never have happened had we had the whole building available to spread out in.

What's more, the scaffold served as the perfect visual aid to support the Bible verse we were reflecting on, "In Jesus, all things hold together". Scaffolding speaks of holding up, supporting, giving shape and structure – a framework from which something can be created, or restored. Scaffolding speaks of 'work in progress'.

All of us are just that – a 'work in progress'. None of us are the finished product – not just yet! We are on a journey towards becoming that which we have the God-given potential to be. For that to happen we need a framework of support – a scaffold – and that is exactly what a living faith in Jesus offers.

I speak regularly to people who, having found that support and sense of being 'held up' by a relationship with God, find the courage and confidence to take up new things, reach new heights, and face those damaged areas of their lives which need God's restoration. It is one of the greatest thrills of my role to see that happening, one life at a time. "I'd never have believed I would be doing this today – isn't it amazing?" "I couldn't have done that without God's help." Each transformation is as unique as each individual, but each has the hallmark of the Master Builder, God, whose plan for each of our lives is better than we could begin to imagine. These are lives made new.



This is at the heart of the journey through Lent to the promise of new life at Easter. It's not just theoretical, 'nice idea' stuff. It's life-changing stuff. And as we make our journey through Lent towards Easter, may we know the joy and anticipation of that.

Henry Bear's Baptism Party – Buns and Fun.

Every alternative year, at Candlemas, we invite children who have been baptised to join us for a service. Due to the popularity of Henry Bear with the Playgroup children, the children were invited to his Baptism Party. All baptised children aged between 2 and 6 were invited.

With 15 children and almost twice as many adults, Henry Bear was roused from sleep by the boisterous singing, and proceeded to show the children his homemade crown. The crown bore the words, "Henry Bear is special to God", a reminder of the message of his baptism day.

The children then proceeded to make their own crowns (with the able assistance of parents and helpers) which were worn with pride for the rest of the celebration.

One of the highlights for many of the children were the 'waterlily' prayers, which opened up as if by magic to send the prayer up to God, when placed on water. (Great fun for the grown-ups too. I suspect this will become a bath time game for some of these youngsters!) Then, after renewing baptism vows, we all got thoroughly splashed as a reminder of our baptism.

As an alternative to the candle as a symbol of the light of Christ, each child was given a small glow-stick which they waved as they sang, "Baptism candle shining bright "(Tune :Skip to my Lou).

Of course, after all this action, Henry Bear was exhausted and in need of a nap, so he was sung to sleep while all the rest went to the back of church for a feast of buns, crisps and biscuits. No baptism party would be complete without them.

A big thank you to all the folk who worked to support this -providing the buns, serving refreshments, playing the piano (I know -' Here we go round the Mulberry Bush' is not a tune most church organists would be required to know!! Thank you,John!)

My own experience is that worship like this is invigorating for adults too, and the children's responsiveness to Jesus means you always get back more than you give. Churches should have more of this!

A fresh look at Communion – the Passover Meal


The way we celebrate Communion, wonderful as it is, is undoubtedly very different to the way Jesus celebrated the Last Supper with his disciples. For one thing, Jesus was not in a place of worship at the time! And the bread and wine were shared in the context of a family meal of celebration – the Jewish Passover Meal.

Passover was the biggest celebration of the year (equivalent to our Christmas) and was prepared for weeks in advance. It commemorated the time when Moses led the people out of slavery in Egypt. God's people had been protected by the blood of a Lamb daubed on the doorposts of their homes, and so death passed them by – unlike the Egyptians. As Jesus celebrated the meal, he was giving it a new significance – he was to be the new Passover Lamb whose blood would release his people from death's power. Seeing this Jewish meal through Christian eyes allows us to see Communion in a new light too.

I first experienced a Passover Meal some 25 years ago when, as a member of All Saints' Normanton, we were fortunate enough to have a curate whose wife had been brought up a Jew, and had found faith in Jesus. Michele never thought of herself so much as a Christian as a 'Completed Jew' – a Jew who has found the final and complete truth her faith had missed – Jesus. She introduced us to this wonderful meal which opened our eyes to the heritage which would have been second nature to Jesus, and using a service as close as possible to that which would have been used in the Upper Room.

Why not experience it for yourself? On Maundy Thursday (5th April) at 7.00 pm in the Parish Centre we will be holding our own Passover Meal, and everyone's invited! We ask you to bring along an item of food for a shared meal – the only rule being there must be NO bread! (Jewish women sweep the floor thoroughly in preparation to make sure there is not so much as a crumb to be found). Unleavened bread (Matzos) will be provided, and wine (non-alcoholic as most will be driving and it is meant to be drunk in plentiful quantities!).. But bring along a pie, a salad, a cake, a pizza, cold meats etc – it will all add to the sense of occasion. And don't eat any tea before you come – you'll need all the stomach space you can get!

I promise you, experiencing Passover will enrich your appreciation of the roots of the Communion we celebrate every week. Just sign up on the sheet in the porch so we know how many places to set at table. You won't regret coming! The experience will finish by 9 pm, at which point the church will be open for an hour of quiet prayer for those who wish to be there, just as Jesus left the party atmosphere of the Passover to pray in the Garden of Gethsemane.


Butterfly

Re-development update.

The PCC have decided to press ahead with an application for faculty approval to proceed with the redevelopment project.

The legal process is a requirement for any work planned for a church building, whereby the plans have to be checked and approved by a panel of experts in church architecture and furnishings.

Although the faculty process can be cumbersome and is invariably met with groans from any church council (and especially from the Churchwardens responsible for their completion) it is a safeguard.

It means that no maverick priest can come along, persuade their PCC to pursue a course which will damage the building and its aesthetic interest, and get away with it. All work needs to be considered carefully and impartially by those who are charged with authorising adaptations to buildings.

Nothing will get through the process which has not been approved by the authorities. Time-consuming as it is, we should rejoice that these safeguards are in place to prevent us from making mistakes which we may live to regret.

Once faculty approval has been given, the only obstacle to getting the work started is the finance. We will have to do everything we can to apply for grants, and will need to show that we as a church and community are prepared to invest in the project personally. So, if you can organise an event, or do a sponsored 'bungee jump' or wing walk(!!) (or something more sedate) to help raise funds, go for it!

We should not suppose that 'Someone' will have to come along and foot the bill for us – there is a responsibility on *our* shoulders to show financial commitment to this project. It is certainly not beyond what God can achieve through us.

A number of folk have reminded me that we caught the vision to raise money for the new organ, and £22,000 was raised in a fortnight – through US! And the sheer joy in everyone's faces when we realised that shows just how fulfilling the challenge became. We have a sense of real pride in the new organ because we can look at it and say, "We did that – by the grace of God and to his glory!"

Imagine how wonderful it will feel to be able to stand in the west end of church and say the same. The wonder of what God is able to do through us ordinary people should thrill and inspire us to believe great things of him for the future.

In fact, I'm convinced that whilst our agenda might be to get better facilities in our church building, God's agenda might be different. His intention might just be to grow our faith to believe that he can do great things through people like us. May that be our experience as we pursue this exciting but scary journey.





Supporting Mum – The grace of giving.

What lengths would you go to to support your mum? What sacrifices would you make to ensure her security and well-being? Most of us would do whatever it takes and gladly, aware of the support we'd been given when we needed it.

On Mothering Sunday, 18th March, we'll be reflecting on the way in which the church has nurtured and supported us, instilling good things in our lives. Despite its more secular expression, Mothering Sunday did not originate so much as a focus on our mums, but on the church as mother. It's a day therefore to ask ourselves what lengths are we prepared to go to support the work which happens at St. Mary's?

We are encouraged that the ministry of our church extends far beyond the congregation who form the core of its life, and is able to touch and enrich many others – those who seek support in times of bereavement, those who wish to get married, youngsters whose social lives and skills are broadened through uniformed organisations, the Playgroup, Mums and Toddler groups. Then there are those who enjoy the social gatherings, barn dances, quizzes, concerts, and Garden parties. There are others too – those who turn up at the Vicarage in need of practical support in emergencies, in need of pastoral support in trauma, in need of spiritual support when life's big questions are pressing. There are the school groups and historical societies who come to explore the history and heritage contained and given visual expression in the beauty of a church building which is older than any other structure in our community. St. Mary's is far from being a church there for a devoted few – it is a church which thrives on being there for all. We reckon that as many as 12,000 people access our facilities each year – and that doesn't include those who come for funerals and weddings.

All this seeks to be part of the motherly role of support, nurture and care – so as you can see, this is a hands-on mum who delights in being there. We want to be able to be there in the future, to extend the welcome St. Many's is increasingly known for to others, and to ensure we can continue to help and support folk who need it. For that reason we are appealing to all those who are linked to our church in whatever way to consider whether they might help us financially to sustain and extend our ministry.

If you believe in supporting mums, what about the Mother Church? If you give already, could you perhaps increase your gift? If you don't, would you consider doing so? For more information, speak to Gary, the Church Treasurer, on 0113 252 8935. Sunday 18th March, Mothering Sunday, will see us making our response of thanksgiving to God and his church. We'd love you to join us.


