What is Advent? ...and why should we celebrate it?

It's Christmas time. How does your to-do list look?

There are sales to shop and presents to wrap. There are cards to send and decorations to unpack. There are parties to attend, events to plan, and trips to make.

There are long lines, traffic, stress, delays, and expectations.

That's the time of year it is. It's Christmas time.

But in the midst of all this, we're supposed to remember that it's the time of Christ, the time we remember and celebrate His coming.

What if there were a way to put aside all the trappings of Christmas so we could look forward to the joy of Christmas?

Well, there is.

For hundreds and hundreds of years, believers all over the world have observed Advent.

For four Sundays before Christmas Day, Christians have paused to reflect on the longing Israel had for their coming Messiah, and the joy we as Christians have knowing He is with us.

The colours of Advent may seem strange to those of us used to the red and green of Christmas. Purple represents Christ's majesty. Pink, the hope of His appearance. And white, the promise that one day He will come again.

Christians have even sung Advent hymns many of us know as Christmas carols: hymns such as "Come, Thou Long Expected Jesus," and "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel."

Every Christmas, Christians try to remember the "reason for the season." We struggle to hold onto the joy and peace we know is there, but that we often can't find amidst the clamour and urgency of the "holidays."

Through Scripture readings, songs and prayers, Advent can become a time to focus your mind on Christ and to prepare your heart for the coming Christ child, A child who will grow into the man Jesus, who went to the cross, who died for our sins, so that we may be blameless in the sight of almighty God.

It's a paradox that the babe whose birth we celebrate at Christmas has to be held in tension with the pain and desolation of the cross of Good Friday.

As Christians today, we know that it doesn't end there, but those first Disciples didn't. They had to wait in fear and dread.

Advent is a time of waiting, a time of preparation, a time for reflection on our relationship with the coming Saviour of the World. Are we truly ready to welcome God's Son? Are we prepared to carry the cross of Christ? Are we ready to put Jesus first in our lives?

Advent is the time we see the darkness of the world, and wait for the light of Christ, a light that no darkness can quench!

Advent Reflection

Week 1 - Faith (Weeks 1, 2,3 & 4 will be given out in Church so come along and collect the set!)

Scripture Verses

"Wait for the LORD; be strong and courageous. Wait for the LORD" (Psalm 27:14).

"Now without faith it is impossible to please God, for the one who draws near to Him must believe that He exists and rewards those who seek Him." —Hebrews 11:6

What's the longest you've had to wait for something? We expect everything to be at our fingertips the moment we have the desire for it. Yet God finds ways of making us wait.

Waiting and faith go hand-in-hand. Waiting is the embodiment of faith.

In Hebrews 11:13 we are reminded that faith involves trust in God's promise even if the promises of God are fulfilled long after we're gone. The writer says, "These all died in faith without having received the promises, but they saw them from a distance ..." (Emphasis added.)

We are asked to remain faithful in our waiting

What are you waiting on God for this year?

Remember the years of silence as God's people waited for the Messiah.

Take time today, to reflect on the fact that God's timing is quite different from ours.

The story of Jesus' birth gives us assurance and joy because even though the waiting lingered for decades, God broke through at just the right time.

Are you struggling with a lack of faith? Jesus encouraged his frustrated followers this way: "If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you will tell this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you" (Matthew 17:20).

Most of us try to grow a forest in one day. Jesus, however, invites you to begin with a tiny seed. Watch it grow and wait for it to become all that you dreamed it would be.

Are you willing to plant faith and wait upon God? Nothing seems to be appearing on the horizon today, but just wait! God always keeps his promises, even to those who have little faith. Just wait.


This week:- Share with a friend or family member something you are waiting for.

Prayerful Thought

Bah Humbug!!

Well not really, but I have had to rethink and change my prayerful thought a little as that there Vicar has 'pinched' my theme! That's not surprising really is it as we start the new Christian Year with the season of Advent, and the trappings of Christmas.

I've had to change things a little bit, but I thought I would still share some of my thoughts with you.

It was the night before...

Well bonfire night actually, and I received a text from a friend who I haven't seen in a while, one of a group of four of us who try and get together every few months or so, and I had been in touch with this group trying to arrange a date to meet. This one friend, at the end of her text added... "are you ready for Santa?" and it was this comment, and still having fresh in my mind last month's prayerful thought, that got me thinking about this month's article.

If you can remember back to my last article (or have a look on our Facebook page, past magazines are on there) you may remember that I was talking about 'reflection', and the importance of contemplation and 'developing forms of contemplation that work for us and open us up to the sense of wonder'.

I started thinking about the build up and preparation for Christmas, and that a simple question, "Are you ready for Santa?" seemed to encapsulate for me perhaps the most mundane preparation towards Christmas.

For many people, Christmas is just making lists, ticking things off lists, shopping for food and drink, shopping for presents, a process to be got through as speedily as possible. Getting things done early, 'Right, been there, done that, got the presents!' But wait a moment, think back to what I said about 'contemplation' what was it? Something about 'opening up to the sense of wonder?'.

This brings me to another thing some folks say, not untruthfully, but perhaps superficially, "Well, Christmas it's all for the children isn't it?" Well yes, I don't doubt that Christmas is a time for children, but then think about that a little deeper for a moment. If your children are all grown up now with children of their own, or perhaps like me you don't have children, it shouldn't stop us celebrating Christmas. After all we are all God's children!

Do you know why people say Christmas is a time for children? Because they remember perhaps Christmases many years ago, and in a lot of cases, so so different from the Christmases of today. A more simple time of stockings with a tangerine in the bottom and a few walnuts??!! And perhaps a new bicycle every few years. Not the hundreds of pounds advertisements tell us we must spend in order to have all the right food to eat and drink, the right decorations and the 'must have' toy for this year.

But not only that, are we remembering that sense of wonder when we as children, or our children when they were younger, with eyes almost popping out of their heads, opened their presents.

Yes, that is what we want, to bring back that sense of wonder, that wide eyed wonder.

It has become a greatly anticipated moment when the big retailers reveal their Christmas advertisements and it is great that this year they seem to be focussing on Christmas as a time for sharing and who can forget glamorous Mrs Claus, or Buster the Boxer and not sit transfixed as we see the wonder on people's faces.

So now then, what's the best way to get better at something? Practice...practice, practice, repeat things do them again and again. I challenge you again this month to take some time to contemplate.

Yes I know it's a busy time, and no doubt will get busier, I know we've lots to do, but do find yourself some time for contemplation if you possibly can.

Rev Sharon is providing us with a weekly 'Advent Reflection', the first week was 'Faith', did you manage to read through it whilst you were having a cuppa? Did you take it on the bus or train, WHATEVER! If you haven't had chance yet, do try and find time to read it, (you can read it on P11—Ed), you'll have the second one by now as well. Also, there are the Wednesday evening services of 'Silent Reflection' the first one was on the 30th November, there are three further ones at Westerton Road Methodist Church on the 7th December, St Michael's East Ardsley and finally at West Ardsley Methodist Church. This may be the chance for you to have time for contemplation, see if you can manage to get to one of them at least.

Let our preparation be so much more than lists and sighs of relief as we cross another thing off our 'to do' list. I'll repeat one of my favourite sayings to help you...

"You will never FIND time for anything, if you WANT to do something you must MAKE time"

I pray that all of us may make time for contemplation this advent, whether in our homes or with our church friends, I pray that God will help us all to prepare for Jesus' coming in Bethlehem so that we can all, as God's children, rediscover and share the wonder of Christmas.

St. Nicholas, Santa Claus or Father Christmas

The Man behind the Story of Father Christmas/Santa Claus

St. Nicholas was a bishop who lived in the fourth century in a place called Myra in Asia Minor (now called Turkey). He was a very rich man because his parents died when he was young and left him a lot of money. He was also a very kind man and had a reputation for helping the poor and giving secret gifts to people who needed it. There are several legends about St. Nicholas, although we don't know if any of them are true.

The most famous story about St. Nicholas tells how the custom of hanging up stockings to get presents first started! It goes like this:

There was a poor man who had three daughters. He was so poor, he did not have enough money for a dowry, so his daughters couldn't get married. (A dowry is a sum of money paid to the bridegroom by the bride's parents on the wedding day. This still happens in some countries, even today.) One night, Nicholas secretly dropped a bag of gold down the chimney and into the house (This meant that the oldest daughter was then able to be married.) The bag fell into a stocking that had been hung by the fire to dry! This was repeated later with the second daughter. Finally, determined to discover the person who had given him the money, the father secretly hid by the fire every evening until he caught Nicholas dropping in a bag of gold. Nicholas begged the man to not tell anyone what he had done, because he did not want to bring attention to himself. But soon the news got out and when anyone received a secret gift, it was thought that maybe it was from Nicholas.

Because of his kindness Nicholas was made a Saint. St Nicholas is not only the saint of children but also of sailors! One story tells of him helping some sailors that were caught in a dreadful storm off the coast of Turkey. The storm was raging around them and all the men were terrified that their ship would sink beneath the giant waves. They prayed to St. Nicholas to help them. Suddenly, he was standing on the deck before them. He ordered the sea to be calm, the storm died away, and they were able to sail their ship safely to port.

St. Nicholas was exiled from Myra and later put in prison during the persecution by Emperor Diocletian. No one is really sure when he died, but it was on 6^{th} December in either 345 or 352. In

1087, his bones were stolen from Turkey by some Italian merchant sailors. The bones are now kept in the Church named after him in the Italian port of Bari. On St. Nicholas feast day (6^{th} December), the sailors of Bari still carry his statue from the Cathedral out to sea, so that he can bless the waters and so give them safe voyages throughout the year.

In 1066, before he set sail to England, William the Conqueror prayed to St. Nicholas asking that his conquest would go well.

How St. Nicholas became Santa Claus

In the 16th Century in Northern Europe, after the reformation, the stories and traditions about St. Nicholas became unpopular.

But someone had to deliver presents to children at Christmas, so in the UK, particularly in England, he became 'Father Christmas' or 'Old Man Christmas', an old character from stories played out during the middle ages in the UK and parts of northern Europe. In France, he was known as 'Pere Noel' in Germany. The 'Christ Kind'. In the early USA his named was 'Kris Kringle'. Later, the Dutch settlers in the USA took the old stories of St. Nicholas with them and Kris Kringle became 'Sinterklaas' or as we now say 'Santa Claus'!

Many countries, especially ones in Europe, celebrate St. Nicholas' Day on 6th December. In Holland and some other European Countries, children leave clogs or shoes out on the 5th December (St. Nicholas Eve) to be filled with presents. They also believe that if they leave some hay and carrots in their shoes for Sinterklaas's horse, they will be left some sweets.

St. Nicholas became popular again in the Victorian era when writers, poets and artists rediscovered the old stories.

In 1823 the famous poem 'A Visit from St. Nicholas' or 'T'was the night before Christmas' was published. Dr Clement Clarke Moore later claimed that he had written it for his children. (Some scholars now believe that it was actually written by Henry Livingston, Jr., who was a distant relative of Dr Moore's wife.) The poem describes St. Nicholas with eight reindeer and gives them their names. They became really well known in the song 'Rudolph the Red nosed Reindeer', written in 1949.

Did you know that Rudolph might actually be a girl? Only female reindeer keep their antlers throughout winter. By Christmas time most males have discarded their antlers and are saving their energy ready to grow a new pair in the spring.

The UK Father Christmas and American Santa Claus became more and more alike over the years and are now one of the same

Some people say that Santa lives at the North Pole. In Finland they say that he lives in the north part of their country called Lapland.


But, everyone agrees that he travels the sky on a sledge that is pulled by reindeer, that he comes into houses down the chimney at night and places presents for the children in socks or bags by their beds, in front of the family Christmas tree, or by the fire place.

Most children receive their presents on Christmas Eve night or early Christmas morning, but in some countries they get their presents on St. Nicholas Eve, December 5^{th} .

St. Nicholas putting the bag of gold into a stocking is probably where the custom of having tangerine and satsuma at the bottom of your Christmas stocking came from. If people couldn't afford gold, some golden fruit was a good replacement - and until the last

50 years these were quite unusual fruits and so special.

St. Nicholas was a very special man. But we also have to remember that we are also celebrating a very special birthday on Christmas Day of Jesus born into to our world to give us love and peace in our Tives. So why not come and join us over this festive time at St. Mary's as we as Christians give thanks for the birth of our Lord into our world. Joy to the world and have a very merry Christmas.

Charlotte's Moroccan Adventure

Hello everyone!

Some of you may or may not know me but I'm Charlotte Sykes and I attended an expedition with Central Yorkshire Scouts to Morocco to help build a school for a village less fortunate than ourselves. Not only that but we also worked on irrigation and dry stone walling. A huge thank you to Gail and Sharon for making the presentation evening possible on Monday 21st November and for all that attended I give you permission to skip past this section of the magazine as I will be giving a short overview of the trip and I am aware that it may have got to the point of too much of a good thing!

Anyhow, the trip started in a small village called Imlil, it was a magical place to be, we camped right next to the waterfall! The "squattie" toilet facilities were somewhat uncomfortable but no pain no...well, you get the picture I'm sure. The trees were a beautiful green and the air was clean and fresh. We were greeted very warmly by the villagers and split into girls and boys. The girls learned some household skills and the men did

work on the irrigation and dry stone walls around the village. For me, obviously, I went with some of the local women and learned how to make mint tea and flat bread all from scratch, it was quite extraordinary how these people lived. We then helped the women in weaving a blanket by hand and let me tell you, it's not as easy as it sounds, balls and balls of wool used to make the



beautiful design. But I have to say, I think the men earned their supper that night!

We went on a lovely walk to a peak, led by our guides in preparation for the walk up the mountain. It was amazing, the views from the peek were just breath taking, the blue sky, the trees, the village, all such humble imagery but to be there was just spectacular.

The Next phase of the expedition was the mountain phase. SO MUCH WALKING. Toubkal is 4,167m high and it took us 10/11 hours to walk up and down but it was SO worth it, the accomplishment not just for myself but as a group just gave

everyone this immense feeling of pride. My mountain guide Mohammed was honestly the most amazing man I think I've ever met, he was so encouraging and the amount of times he must've saved me from falling off that mountain is too much to count, he



kept us all going. The Refuge we stayed at was at the base of the mountain and had running water!! You can imagine the excitement when we haven't had a shower in 4/5 days! Actual toilets was a treat as well and I can confirm, EVERYONE took advantage of that...very smelly. Being in the mountains really tested my resilience and brought the expedition really close together and I can't out into words how magical that place was. I don't think I've ever heard such silence, or not heard I should say, it was peaceful.

We went back to Imlil after the mountain phase and the village arranged a party where we learned some traditional dance and showed them how to Strip the willow, safe to say that

everyone slept soundly that night! We then travelled by nonair-conditioned minibuses for 9 hours to El Borge where we worked on building the school. We started work at 8am every day



and didn't finish until 5pm. There were 4 shovels, 2 wheel barrows, lots of stones and lots rocks. We also had some cement powder with some small stones to mix. Everyone was put into groups and put on work shifts, some making cement, some on rocks and some on water (from the well for the cement). The shifts were 10-15 minutes long which doesn't seem a lot to you but temperatures got up to 55 degrees which was a dry heat so water was our best friend. We had a flood on one of the days which was a blessing at first, we danced and washed our hair in it but it came down so strong that it flooded the camp so we stayed the night in a nearby house. Bear in mind that there's 50 of us who turned up on this poor families door step and they welcomed us in open arms and made supper for everyone! Soup, then main and then mint tea for after. Imagine 50 people turning up on your door step asking to take refuge! The people were so humble and genuinely happy that we stayed in their house, I still can't believe it! When we left El Borge the whole village thanked us with a party and we got to meet some of the children who will benefit from the school and gave them clothes and coloring books. Some of them hugged us and didn't let go! The joy this expedition has brought not only us but them is amazing, it's good to give back.

The final two phases of the expedition was the desert phase and Marrakesh. The desert at night was so peaceful, the stars were so clear and again, the silence was soothing. This is where it started to dawn on us that we were leaving and it gave us time to reflect on everything we'd achieved. And the when it came to morning...well....the Camels are not creatures of early mornings I'll tell you that, in fact mine chewed through its ropes and ran off with me still on it! The guides again were so amazing, at the end of the phase they, like everywhere, threw a party with music and dancing, it was such a lovely cultured experience. Marrakesh was beautiful, a city that was bursting with life. We spent the final few days there and bought gifts and stayed in a youth hostel with working bathrooms! It was a significant improvement to the holes in the ground!

Finally I just want to say a huge thank you to everyone who has supported me and donated to the charity at both my fundraiser and my presentation. The at the fundraiser we raised over £250 for the Sahara Children's Charity and at the presentation evening your donations came to £77! A huge thank you to all who donated or attended these events. I'd like to thank especially Gail, Trevor and Gareth, without whom I would not have had this opportunity, they've watched me grow up over the years and shaped me as a person in the way they're so kind and encouraging.

Scouting IS a family but these guys are more than my family, I don't know where I would be without the experiences and opportunities them and Scouting as a whole has opened up to me. I just hope this inspires more young people to go out and

make a difference in someone's life because whether it be here or somewhere else in the world giving back is so important.


