

Vicar's Letter

I am very definitely a stick in the mud. I don't like Christmas in September, October and November. I want to see Christmas through the eyes of my childhood when the Christmas Tree went up one week before Christmas and then you started to buy presents and put them under the tree. I remember the excitement of going to bed and not being able to sleep.

When I had my own children, the routine pretty much stayed the same. The Christmas Tree went up one week to ten days before Christmas and then when the children were small (and I wasn't as involved in church) we would have the weekend before Christmas away staying in a Travel Lodge and we would buy and wrap all our presents. We then did the Christmas food shopping on the way home. We simply unloaded the car put the presents under the tree and the food in the fridge. Sorted. Except it wasn't because of course there were still the children's presents to sort out.


The purpose of our adventure was to teach the kids that there was another side to Christmas, that it wasn't just about what they received, it was also about what they could give and that involved effort. We provided them with an allowance and they had to work out how many people they had to buy for (15 people at £2.00 a head). They then had to work out what they would buy and who would wrap it. The boys quickly learned that Lizzy was the organiser. Once they started work, part time jobs, provided their own money to buy presents.


But there was still another lesson for them to learn, that Christmas was much more than the giving and receiving of gifts. We purposely didn't buy expensive presents (and still don't). It is a time to get together with family and loved ones. It is a time to gather at church and to remember the real meaning of Christmas – to a child it is Jesus' birthday – to an adult it is God made man. God himself came among us and lived among us – not as a King, not as a wealthy ruler but as a vulnerable helpless child born to a teenage mother. The Christmas story is full of unlikely characters and those on the edges find themselves at the centre of the action. The unimportant get

starring roles. The forgotten are the first to know. It's a story of the unexpected. It flips the world on its head. It changes everything.

There are many opportunities this Christmas to come to St Mary's and hear the Christmas Story, and to remember the gift that God has given us, His Son, Jesus Christ, the baby that grows into the man on the cross, the man that is fully human and fully divine, Christ the King, the Son of God who came as part of God's plan to redeem the human race. Come and be redeemed, come and be welcomed, come and be loved or just simply come and be still.

Prayerful Thought an 'Adventus'

Hello there

By the time you read this we will have started our advent season towards Christmas, you will have opened some of the little doors on your advent calendar (or perhaps burnt a few days down on your advent candle) your Advent (ure) will have begun.

It is so easy to get swept along in our Christmas preparations and almost forget about Advent, these four Sunday's prior to Christmas, but really we should make sure that Advent is in all our planning because Advent comes from the Latin word Adventus meaning 'arrival', a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the coming of baby Jesus in the manger in Bethlehem all those centuries ago.

I always smile to myself with some of the advertisements I see on television or hear on radio for things like new kitchens, new sofa's and new boilers etc because these things really don't need in anyway to be done at this time of year really do they?

I mean yes, it's lovely having these things new, and if you have been thinking about it and are expecting family and friends to visit then they can be really lovely, but if we think about it, we could have changed our sofa's boilers or kitchens in the previous 11 months of the year really.

I also remember my dear dad causing my mum additional stress at Christmas when with only a couple of weeks to go, he decided he must repaint the kitchen!

Amongst former work colleagues, church family and actual family, three ladies have given birth to their first children (all boys!) since the beginning of October, and three ladies are preparing for the birth of babies in the next 4-6 weeks (two are first babies, the other is a second one). Now never having had a baby myself I can' speak from first-hand experience, but I bet all six ladies did or are preparing as much as possible for their new arrivals, and are preparing for their lives to change completely.

Well Advent is the same, it enables us to be giddy and excited about the coming of a baby, the nice thing is we only have to hear, read and sing about it, not get involved in the messy and sometimes painful side of things! Unlike a lot of our other preparations for Christmas, it also doesn't cost us anything, which as a Yorkshire person should please us all!

Whilst I know we can't just stop our day to day lives and all our preparations, it might be nice if you can just take a little bit of time during Advent to shift your focus a little from all the commercialism, the encouragement to buy tons of food and strive for that perfect Christmas dinner, to think about that young family all those centuries ago.

Their Christmas wasn't perfect, far from it. A poor young mum heavily pregnant having to travel on the back of a donkey on dusty uneven roads, a frightened father to be, a simple carpenter, not well paid, trying to care for his wife and child, a bustling busy town with no spare room, so a stable with the animals was all they could find. And yet, into all this mayhem, the saviour of the world was born.

Jesus was born for all of us, whether we are ordering a new sofa or making do with the one we've had for years or one our family gave us, whether we have tables groaning with food or will be making do with something simple, whether we live in a two up two down, nice little bungalow, big sprawling mansion or a shop doorway.

Try and take a few moments every day or every week during advent to have your own (or family) adventus, time of expectant waiting and preparation for the coming again of the Christ child born in a manger. Read the Christmas story in Luke Chapter 2 verses 1-20 or there are many children's versions you can share as a family.

My name is Gail and I am old.

They will still bear fruit in old age" (Psalm 92:14).

I know, I know. Some of you think I'm bragging. And maybe I am. But even though it has a few drawbacks and as some have said, "Growing old is not for sissies," there is much to be said for the golden/silver years in trying to serve the Lord. I have lived through many decades on this planet, have seen things few around me have experienced (and have the scars to bear witness), the lessons learned are solid and sure, and my reasoning powers have not abandoned me

Psalm 92:12-15: "The righteous one will flourish like the palm tree, He will grow like a cedar in Lebanon. They will still yield fruit in old age; they shall be full of sap and very green, to declare that the Lord is upright; He is my Rock, and there is no unrighteousness in Him."

Those four verses are keepers, such memorable lines. I love this little text but in no way have I mastered the content.

Fruitful. Bearing fruit in old age. God's senior saints often have energy, will (hopefully) have the skills, and always have the experience which can bless so many who are coming behind them. But they must not allow themselves to be put on the shelf. They have so much to offer.

Look around to see who we can bless.

Want to see how this works? Check out Barzillai in Second Samuel, chapters 15-19. When King David was fleeing Jerusalem with his little entourage—his son Absalom was leading an insurrection and storming the city—as they crossed the Jordan River, the royal party was hosted by several old friends, including Barzillai (see 17:27-29).

Later, when Absalom is dead and the rebellion over, David is returning home. At the Jordan, he invites Barzillai to, as we say, "Come on and go home with me." David wanted to repay his hospitality.

Barzillai's answer is classic. "I don't have long to live, so why should I go up to your city and be a burden on you? I'm 80 years old. I can't distinguish any longer between good and bad. I can't taste the food I eat. I'm so deaf I can't even hear the singing of my people." He thought a minute and then said, "However, here is Chimham. Let him go with you. Do for him whatever you think is fitting." (19:31.)

Whether Chimham was his son, his grandson, or the son of a friend or servant, we have no idea. But do not miss what happened there: The old man gave the youth to the king! He endowed the youngster in a life-changing way.

Barzillai changed forever the destiny of that young man and all who would come after him. That is bearing fruit in old age.

Lead a youngster to Christ, send a young person a bible, buy someone's groceries and don't let them know where it came from. Youthful. They're full of sap.

The life of a tree is in its sap, those nutritious fluids running up the veins of the trunk and throughout the limbs right out to the very ends of the leaves.

Some of the youngest people I know are the oldest ones in church. They are full of life, happy in the Lord, overflowing with love and laughter, fun to be around. They are still learning and growing and serving. They are the most positive, upward-looking people in the congregation, the ones readiest to "tear down this old building and construct something for the future!" They appreciate their history, but love their Lord and God's people far more. They are not so attached to the old hymns (which they love) that they cannot enjoy learning a new song.

Someone told me about their grandmother who went to live them. Each morning as the family awakened, they could hear Grandma singing through the walls and knew she was all right. But one morning, no sound came from her room. They began to worry after a bit and one of the kids was about to go and check on her, when all of a sudden, her lovely voice was heard singing, Grandma was just fine.

Young people love to sing and laugh, to learn and read and have fun, to get together with friends and to hug. The saddest thing you'll ever see is people who grow elderly long before their time. Let's not let it happen to us.

Beautiful.

Now, when we have arrived at this stage in life, senior disciple, where we see these things and know these truths, tell them! Do not keep this wisdom to yourself.

Tell our story, old-timer. The rest need to hear it. I know, I know. You're saying, "But they don't want to hear it. They don't have time."

It's true that they are rushed and don't have long attention spans. So, here are some suggestions:

- 1. Write short articles there, telling experiences you had and lessons you learned the hard way.
- 2. Remember to tell the good and the bad, the bright and the dark. Each has contributions to make to the effectiveness of the other. By giving the downside, you make the upside authentic. By telling the upside, the great things, you give hope to those going through the valleys.
- 3. An alternative is to write a book. Type it or handwrite it, your choice. And—repeating myself here—do not burden yourself with the need to do it perfectly or you'll go to heaven with not a line written. Get on with it. Tell everyone what you learned. Tell what you know of the Lord Jesus Christ and His way. Tell everyone what you got right and what you wish you could do over.

Have fun. Laugh. After all, you're full of sap.

Christian Aid: Helping people with disabilities help themselves.

Almost half of Ghana's young people are unemployed and those who are disabled face further challenges in supporting themselves and their families.

Mary Cudjoe, 30, lives in a suburb of the Ellembelle district in the western region of Ghana, with her ten-year-old son and three-year-old daughter. Life has been very hard, as her condition means she is unable to farm or fish to earn a living, and she has been reliant on her parents to support her and her children.

Thanks to your support of this project, Mary has been learning how to make soap. She has now started producing liquid soap and hair products on a small scale to sell at local markets.

Mary said: 'I have now acquired the skills to set up my own business which will enable me to support my family financially 'Business is gradually picking up and I have so far made some profit from the business. My dream is to have the biggest soap selling shop in the Ellembelle district and also have agents in nearby districts who sell my products.

'I have high hopes that my business will grow and make me self-reliant so I can cater well for my parents and children. Mary is growing more independent and now wants to help her neighbours. She says: 'I would want to extend a helping hand to other people with disabilities by training them in soap making in order to improve their living conditions. I would like to thank the supporters for their goodwill towards the project and I urge

them to continue to pray for us.'

Prayers and Psalms

Morning prayer is said in church every weekday at 9am, apart from a Wednesday, and as part of our prayers we usually include prayers for those highlighted in the Diocesan Prayer Diary which includes any particular historical figure for example St Columba, Hilda, Abbess of Whitby etc, then a benefice within the Diocese, its clergy and then within the Anglican Cycle of prayer for somewhere in the world.

I receive email notifications from the Diocese and on a Monday, it popped up that the benefice being prayed for was Woodkirk St Mary's!

It was funny how I felt that I had to be in church that morning, to know that all the churches across our diocese would be praying for us, it made it feel somehow more special.

As well as prayers in these services we also read a psalm and on that day, the psalm for the day was Psalm 62. The version we read from the morning prayer book is slightly different to the various bible versions I looked up at home, but I hope you will be able to take a moment to look up Psalm 62 in the Old Testament.

In another reference book this was listed as 'A psalm of patient trust' a psalm of David, where the psalmist commits his cause to God. It refers to God as 'my rock and my salvation' and urges us to put our 'trust in Him...for God is our refuge'.

It goes on to say 'Put no trust in extortion, and set no vain hopes on robbery; if riches increase, do not set your heart on them and then finishes by saying; '...steadfast love belongs to you, O Lord. For you repay to all according to their work.'

Prayer is one of the simplest things we can do but we forget that others are praying too. Probably the only time you pray when you are not alone is in church on a Sunday (or other day) morning and you

can forget that others all over the world will also be adding their prayers too.

On that November day it was a bit cool and yet my heart was warmed because I knew that people across the diocese were praying for our church and our community.

Many of the psalms are referred to as Psalms of David, and not all the psalms are nice heart-warming ones. However, look at psalm 62, read it through, a 'Song of trust in God alone'.

Put your trust in God...'For God alone my soul waits in silence; from Him comes my salvation. He alone is my rock and my salvation, my fortress; I shall never be shaken'

I was reminded of this contemporary song;

My hope is built on nothing less, Than Jesus' blood and righteousness

I dare not trust the sweetest frame But wholly trust is Jesus' name Christ alone, Cornerstone, Weak made strong in the Saviour's love Through the storm, He is Lord, Lord of all

Take time to pray, if you have access to the internet, you can find the Diocesan prayer diary under the 'Resources' tab on the home page and then scroll right to the bottom of a list of resources and you will find 'Prayer Diary', it will give you a monthly list and will help guide your prayers, and just think, as you pray for the benefices across the diocese they will be able to feel the warmth of our prayers just as I felt the warmth of theirs when they all prayed for us back in November.

Doubt Busters

One of the things I love about the Bible is how honest it is. The pages of Scripture don't gloss over the flaws and sins and weaknesses of people. Even the great heroes of the faith are not airbrushed or photo-shopped to make them look superhuman. I also love that Scripture lets us see the real struggles that people have in seeking to follow God.

One such person in the Bible is a guy named Asaph. You can feel the anguish in his soul when he wrestles with the following questions.

Has the Lord rejected me forever?

Will he never again be kind to me?

Is his unfailing love gone forever?

Have his promises permanently failed?

Has God forgotten to be gracious?

Has he slammed the door on his compassion?

Psalm 77:4-9

If we are honest, we would have to admit that even as christens we have our Asaph moments. But thank goodness, the passage doesn't end in verse nine. As we walk with Asaph we can discover a couple of practices that are helpful to our soul when we find ourselves in seasons of doubt.

Remember God's track record

This is about gaining perspective. This is about stepping back from our immediate circumstance and getting a look at the big picture. I recall all you have done, O Lord; I remember your wonderful deeds of long ago. They are constantly in my thoughts. I cannot stop thinking about them. Psalm 77:11-12

Notice four words in these two verses...recall...remember... thoughts...thinking.

Memory is a friend to faith. I can witness to this personally. God has an amazing track record in my life. And, his faithfulness in the past gives me confidence to deal with the doubts that come in the present. While having time at home nursing a cold, I was thinking about this very point. Looking out the window I watch as a plane s flying overhead, and it got me thinking. Here is a plane flying almost 600 mph at 31,000 feet. There are about 200 of people on board hurtling through the air. It is flying through the clouds. The people on board will not be panicked or even nervous. WHY?? Because they have faith in the airline's track record. They have faith that someone had built the plane well. They have faith that someone had put fuel in the plane. They have faith

that there were pilots in the cockpit (although they may not see them) and they have faith in the instruments they were using to fly the plane.

And, likewise, when I step back and reflect on God's track record, my doubts diminish.

Asaph says "these wonderful deeds are constantly in my thoughts. I cannot stop thinking about them." These events are true. God's track record is historically verifiable. So, if God can deliver 2 million people from Egypt and he can part the Red Sea and he can make the walls fall down at Jericho and he can let Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego come out of the fiery furnace unharmed and he can keep Daniel from being eaten by the lions and Jesus could rise from the dead... then he certainly can take care of me.

If you are going through a time of doubt, spend some time reflecting on God's track record.

Choose to trust God's character and power

Psalm 77:13-14

Our God is a God of miracles and wonder and power. That truth is seen spectacularly in creation.

Think for a moment about the neighbourhood we live in called planet earth. Our sun is 93 million miles away and it is just an average size star in Milky Way Galaxy. And it is perfectly positioned at just the right distance to sustain life on this planet.

The sun is 333,000 times the size of the earth and it is so powerful that it takes its light and heat only 8 minutes to travel from surface of the sun to touch your skin. Every sunrise is a reminder of God's faithfulness. With amazing precision and majesty, the keeps showing up every day.

It hangs up in the sky as a testimony for God's bigness and power and creativity. Psalm 19:1-4 says the heavens tell of the glory of God. The skies display his marvellous craftsmanship.

When we meditate on God's majesty and when we consider his creation, it helps us overcome our doubts. There is freedom in coming to terms with our smallness. Even though our world may seem out of control, the universe isn't out of control. The great big God of the universe can be trusted. He is not powerless or negligent. If we are the crowning achievement of all his creation, don't you think he is going to take care of us?

May we rest in that reality today.

Hopeless or Hopeful?

Hello there

Do you feel hopeless or hopeful?

You might think today, that across our world hope is in short supply, there are so many global issues and hopelessness in our communities, and sadly, most of us will battle with hopelessness at some point in our lives.

But as Christians, we should always remember that no problem is big enough that our God cannot handle it.

A few weeks ago I was in a state of feeling hopeless, something had happened, not a tragedy, but something that made me very upset and I did feel hopeless. I had lost sight of the fact that although I felt alone and hopeless, God was there for me.

It was during opening worship at a meeting I attended, when I was able to refocus and my hope was restored. The chaplain read from St Paul's letters to the Ephesians chapter 1 verses 15 – 19a in which Paul, writing from prison, gives thanks for the faith of the people at Ephesus (in modern day Turkey) and asks that God may give the Ephesians a '...spirit of wisdom and revelation as they come to know Him [God]' and that they '...may know what is the hope to which [God] has called you'.

The chaplain then went on to say that in our prayers we wait and hope and expect God to help. Hope dares us to believe that things will turn out right in the end, we then sang a slightly different version of Amazing Grace, the words of which were;

Amazing grace, how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me I once was lost but now I'm found Was blind but now I see T'was grace that taught my heart to fear And grace my fears relieved How precious did that grace appear The hour I first believed

My chains are gone, I've been set free My God, my Saviour has ransomed me And like a flood His mercy rains Unending love, amazing grace

As Christians, we are called to be people of hope, and Advent is the perfect time to be hopeful for the coming of Jesus. God has given us a new life in a living hope and wants us to share it with others. Life will not stop throwing things at us because we are a flawed people, but when we allow God to build that hope in us that encourages us to share that hope with others. We are the chinks of light in our community, we build our confidence and it gives us hope for our families and friends and across our wider community.

If you are feeling hopeless or have lost hope at the moment, then my thoughts and prayers are with you, that you may come to know the love of God in your life and that your hope in the future may be restored.

In researching this article I discovered that the version of Amazing Grace referred to above was written by an American musical artist called Chris Tomlin and was the soundtrack to the 2006 film Amazing Grace about the campaign against the slave trade in the British Empire, led by William Wilberforce starring Ioan Gruffudd, and you may like to have a search online for 'Amazing Grace – Chris Tomlin' to hear this different but quite beautiful version.

My prayer for you is that you discover, or remember God's love for you, and that you may be filled with hope this advent and Christmas time.
