Vicar's Letter

Here we are at the beginning of December and if you are like me you may be wondering where the time has gone this year—maybe that's just a sign that I'm getting older and the time passes more quickly. Everyone seemingly has too much to do this month as we prepare for Christmas by buying presents, preparing food and deciding who is eating with whom.

So how do we stop and appreciate the season of Advent which this year begins on Sunday 28th November?

Advent is the season that begins four Sundays before 25th December. Advent lasts for four weeks and prepares us for Christmas

We all know Christmas right? Shopping for presents, decorating the tree, singing carols, making gingerbread houses, sending cards, enjoying holiday parties, making a list.. And checking it twice.

However, there is a lot more to it.

Christmas is Christ entering our world and Advent is expectant waiting, hopeful anticipation, and joyful preparation for God coming into our lives and hearts in all moments, in all places, and in all times—past, present and future - commemorating the birth of Jesus, welcoming God into our lives every day, and preparing for Christ's second coming.

Advent prepares us for these events and reminds us there's joy in waiting. Advent even begins a new year for the Church.

Advent is NOT waiting in line to see Santa, rushing around shopping or a race to 25th December

Advent is different from Lent because it's a season of hope, not repentance. Lent is a spring cleaning of our lives. Advent is a cosier time like getting your home ready to welcome a special

guest ... Jesus ...the one we've been waiting for.

The Advent colours are not red and green but purple and rose like the candles on the Advent Wreath. A new candle is lit each week. The third week is rose for Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means Rejoice, don't lose hope. The expected guest has almost arrived.

The progression of the season is also marked with an Advent Calendar with daily surprises (to help with joyful waiting).

Remember Advent isn't about shopping, stressing, planning or buying, it's about expecting, waiting, hoping, and praying.

If we are sick of Christmas by 25th December ... We haven't done Advent correctly. So, this Advent add some meaning to our waiting. Volunteer at a hospital, or soup kitchen, spend some extra time in prayer, be patient with our family, count down the days with an Advent calendar, speak kindly to strangers, go to church and ...share hope with those who need it most while you wait for this very special guest.

We all have things to do and things that need to be done and when you have young children or perhaps grandchildren taking them to see Santa Claus may well be important but it is equally important to take them to a Nativity or a Christingle Service. We may have to rush around at some point to do the Christmas Food Shop but as we plan that we should also plan a time to be still and go to a carol service or pray. It's about balance but it is also about recognising the best present at Christmas is the gift of God's son, Jesus, given to us—Emmanuel means God is with us and for that we should be on our knees in gratitude and thanks that God loves us so much he sent his son to earth, to redeem us by his death on the cross. The Stable and the Cross go hand in hand and we ought to prepare for both.

Meet our New Organist—Mr Stephen Parker



I have been involved with Church music since I joined the Church choir at Ossett Parish Church in 1986. I don't come from a Christian family nor was I ever encouraged to learn to play the organ but God had a plan and I do believe it is a gift. I only joined the choir because there was a gang of us from Gawthorpe who ran into the church disrupting the service and we ran in and shouted out Halleluia. The then Church Warden Ron Brian came and spoke to us, rather than tell us off he asked us to come in and sit in the wardens pew at the back. It was fairly well to do with very smartly dressed people in suits, fur coats and hats we must have looked like a set of roughs. I went back for a few weeks because Ron had been so nice and welcoming. He asked if I was interested in joining the choir and introduced me to the then organist Keith Senior. I was keen to join as you got paid 'ten bob' a service and extra for singing at weddings. I soon became fascinated with the huge pipe organ and wanted to know everything about it. Keith was a great encourager and offered to give me some formal lessons in return for me doing lots of jobs. My parents would not pay for the lessons nor did they want me to be in the choir and they definitely didn't want me to play the organ, but I was determined and continued to follow my passion. I then had more formal piano lessons to improve my technique and learnt to read music - my teachers were John Kinsley and Jeane Knowles. The lessons went very well but I wanted to be on the organ so I used to go to St Marys at Gawthorpe in the evening and they let me play the organ after the service and even play the odd hymn during the service. The then vicar Rev Stephen Mitchill was a very good organist and he too encouraged me to learn more and play for weddings once I could master the music. I then became involved with the Dewsbury Team Parish

and the then Rector John Hawley was keen for me to play at the 6 churches in the team. This was a real chance to gain valuable experience and I played a lot at St Matthews, St Marks and at Dewsbury Minster where David Windle who was the organist really encouraged me and brought me on with a wide variety of musical styles. David is now on the staff at Blackpool Tower and plays regularly in the Ballroom on the world famous Wurlitzer (which I have played and it was a life long ambition to do this). When at Dewsbury Minster I went for further organ lessons to Leeds Minster with Jonathan Lilley who went to be assistant at Ely Cathedral and I also had further lessons with Phillip Tordoff at Halifax Minster. There have been many people who have encouraged and supported me over the years and I have been truly blessed. My longest organist role so far was at Dewsbury Minster for over 20 years. I was also the organist at All Saints Roberttown and St Marys Mirfield. My last post (two Churches) was in Horbury - St Johns Horbury Bridge and St Peters Horbury are both firmly rooted in the Anglo Catholic tradition and I have enjoyed the richness of the liturgy and ceremonial worship there for the last 4 years.

This was a very responsible post with 2 churches to play for and a choir to run. But the job became vacant here at Woodkirk and I've been playing for Weddings and Funerals here for well over 13 years but I've not played for Sunday Worship. I'm very much looking forward to this next chapter in my musical career and Journey of Faith. Music has and is for me an expression of my faith and it can be a powerful way to bring people closer to God. I look forward to working with you and getting to know you as I begin this new ministry here at St Marys.

On a personal note I have had various jobs, when I left school I began an apprenticeship with a church organ builder but I found this work very technical and was beyond my capabilities. I then worked at the Mermaid fish restaurant in Dewsbury, frying and preparing fish in what was then a very busy town centre restaurant with outsales. I later went to work at Woodlands Care Home in Mirfield where I worked for 11 years - this was a very rewarding job and I eventually became activities coordinator working with over 80 residents with alzheimers. A chance then came to go self employed playing at Dewsbury Crematorium and local churches for weddings and funerals. I have done this for 14 years and have played for thousands of funerals and hundreds of weddings but because this job can vary week to week I have some regular hours at Dewsbury Minster as a caretaker/cleaner (this suppliments my income on the quiet weeks when there are no funerals to play for). I have a caravan on the East coast at Filey, I enjoy reading, collecting antiques, going to live concerts and shows and generally socialising with family and friends (and do enjoy a drink and a good laugh). So heres to this new and exiting chapter at St Marys Woodkirk. Who knows what God will have in store or where the journey will lead us as I seek to lead you in worship.

Classical Music and Hymns

I think I've spoken before about my eclectic taste in music, referring to my 'Spotify' digital music playlist which contains many pieces of music from 70's disco, 80's the best music era! and segueing effortlessly into some favourite classical music pieces.

Well this month I've been thinking about those hymns that are set to classical (or more recent) orchestral pieces.

For example, who doesn't think about 'I vow to thee my country' when hearing Holst's Jupiter from the Planet Suite, or how about 'Going Home' to Dvorak's New World, Glorious things of thee are spoken to music by Haydn, or perhaps 'I cannot tell, why He whom angels worship' when hearing Londonderry Air/Danny Boy.

Well I am a bit of a fan of the music of Ralph Vaughan Williams (VW), and a few weeks ago we sang a well known hymn to a well known VW piece, 5 Variants of Dives and Lazarus, in hymn terms known as 'Kingsfold'.

I'm sure some of you will by now have recognised the hymn as being 'I heard the voice of Jesus say'. I cannot hear this classical piece without remembering the words of the first verse of this hymn;

I heard the voice of Jesus say:
'Come unto me and rest;
lay down, thou weary one, lay down
thy head upon my breast.'
I came to Jesus as I was,
weary and worn and sad,
I found in him a resting place,
And he has made me glad.

However, it does this beautiful hymn a disservice if I neglect to include the remaining two verses, which are;

I heard the voice of Jesus say:
'Behold, I freely give
the living water; thirsty one,
stoop down and drink and live.'
I came to Jesus, and I drank
of that life giving stream;
my thirst was quenched, my soul revived,
And now I live in him.

I heard the voice of Jesus say:
'I am this dark world's light;
look unto me, thy morn shall rise,
and all thy day be bright.'
I looked to Jesus, and I found
in him my star, my sun;
and in that light of life I'll walk,
till travelling days are done.

I am truly blessed that one of my favourite classical music tunes is united with one of my favourite hymns.

It starts off in a bit of a sad vein with Jesus telling the weary to come to him for rest, which we can read about in Matthew 11:28 'Come to me all who are weary and burdened and I will give you rest'.

I think this is something it takes a long time to realise. Speaking from my own experience, I rarely admit that I am weary it is usually other people who tell me to take it easy! And sadly it is only usually when I am unwell that I realise how weary I've got.

But then this hymn reminds us, as we can read about in John 4 from verse 7, in the story of Jesus and the woman at the well, that Jesus provides us with 'living water' "...Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life" (vI4), to quench our thirst and revive our souls.

But first we must ask.

Jesus is inviting us, 'come unto me and rest' I'm freely giving you this living water.

Jesus is our dark world's light, and as the evenings draw in, let us remind ourselves that when we answer Jesus' call to rest awhile, to spend time with him in prayer or perhaps some Bible study, we can 'drink that living water' and walk through life with the best of travelling companions.

May we all find that resting place where He can make us glad.

Walk with Jesus

The more I walk with Jesus, the more I'm intrigued with the apostle Paul.

Beyond the great demonstrations of the Holy Spirit's power and the vast territories influenced by his evangelistic voice, I find myself drawn to his humanity. He is one of the most revolutionary people noted in Scripture, yet he is also one of the most accessibly transparent.

His conversion displays one of the most fascinating contrasts of a before/after transformation, but many of his character traits remain intact. In his letters, Paul does not mince words in sharing his insecurities, his frustrations, and his sufferings. He virtually shames the

hurch in Corinth regarding his right to receive financial support from the churches although he doesn't ask for it (I Corinthians 9). He later points to his own deficiencies while also doubling down in a classic tirade about his rightful place as an apostle, making a robust argument full of shallow comparisons and thick sarcasm (I Corinthians I0–I2). He puts Peter on full blast for his hypocrisy in a way that would make most Western ministers blush due to the "lack of love" in his delivery (Galatians 2:11–14).

His humanity is also observable in his interactions with the churches he planted and served with. Luke accounts Paul's final address to the Ephesian elders (Acts20:17–38) as an emotional scene where Paul pours out his affection for the church in word and deed, firmly declaring his actions as observable by those in his company. In stating "my hands ministered to my necessities," he gives us a picture of the leader who works a separate job to provide for his own needs, releasing the burden from the church. He seems so human. How do we look at Paul maybe he doesn't just seem human; he is human. After his seemingly arrogant and self-glorifying treatise, he is still brought to the deafening discovery that only God's grace is sufficient for his weaknesses (2 Corinthians 12:9). We also begin to discover anew his regular pleas for the churches to earnestly pray for him, but Paul invites intercession for himself.

If Paul, being a pastor of pastors, can document his weaknesses for all to see in Scripture, how much more should we as modern Christians articulate our dependency on Jesus. How refreshing the gospel becomes when it becomes good news for us all.

Only Jesus, the chief Shepherd, the righteous High Priest, could wear humanity flawlessly. Only he could bear our failures in perfect submission to the righteousness of God and conquer the grave with all glory and honour due his name.

Christ the King - Sunday 21st November

As promised, please find below, the activity I would have liked us to undertake as part of my sermon for Christ the King, but didn't have time to do.

We celebrate Christ the King, according to Cyril, Patriarch and protagonist in Alexandria in the 5th Century AD to recognise and acknowledge that Christ has dominion or power over all things, and this short activity helps us think about the areas of our lives where we have control or duty, those things entrusted to us, whilst reminding us that we are only stewards of these things, God trusts us with them.

Before you start you need five lengths of yarn/thread/string/gardeners twine!!! (Probably about 12" or 15cm long). You are going to use the fingers of your hand to think about different areas of your life.

We look at our hand, focussing on our thumb, the strongest digit. As we do so we think of our areas of strength, our talents, our skills Choose a piece of yarn to represent the things you are good at, and attach that piece of wool to your thumb leaving a long end. This is the rein that controls our talents.

Next, our index finger: this points the way. Choose another piece of yarn to represent your ambitions and goals, the direction you are headed, this may feel like a bit of an unguided area. Attach the yarn to your index finger again leaving a long end.

Next is our middle finger, our tallest finger: here we think of important people in our lives, the people we admire and follow, perhaps friends and or colleagues, once again leaving a long end, attach this yarn to your middle finger.

Then our ring finger - this is for relationships, this could be with family, with friends, church members, colleagues, again take your yarn and attach it to this finger.

Finally we come to our little finger, the weakest finger – we think about the weaknesses in our lives, are there areas we are finding a struggle? Even if we cannot control circumstances, we can control how we react, attach your last piece of yarn to your little finger.

Hold your hand palm up, gather the five pieces of thread together in your other hand and pull gently, they are all controlled by one hand, these 5 strands are the reins of our lives, these are some of the areas where we are acting as stewards for God. He gives us strengths and talents and good things for us to enjoy and use. God entrusts us with the reins of our lives.

However, remember, we are not supposed to act like the servant who hid his masters money, but to use God's gifts for the benefit of others, but also, as you think about the meaning of each of those strands, you can remove the yarn, those reins on our lives, and symbolically relinquish ultimate control to God, the rightful King.

What's in a Canticle?

Canticles, we say them as part of our services and I dare say in years gone by, Vicars and choirs would probably have chanted or sung them.

The dictionary definition of a canticle is;

- A) A nonmetrical (without particular rhythm) hymn derived from the Bible and used in church liturgy)
- B) A song, poem or hymn that is religious in character

Well, at the end of September, at the Wednesday service, we said a canticle together and it resonated with me, I wanted to share it with you. At first I asked Sharon where Canticles came from but then saw that in this instance it was based on Isaiah, I couldn't find the particular translation but the New International Version (NIV) is fairly close.

The canticle went like this;

Return to the Lord, who will have mercy, to our God, who will richly pardon.

- ¹ Seek the LORD while he may be found, call upon him while he is near;
- ² let the wicked abandon their ways, and the unrighteous their thoughts;
- ³ Return to the LORD, who will have mercy, to our God, who will richly pardon.
- ⁴ 'For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways,' says the LORD.
- ⁵ For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.
- ⁶ As the rain and the snow come down from above, and return not again but water the earth, making it bring forth and sprout,

I'm afraid I don't look at the Old Testament that much, the only things I know about Isaiah was that he was a prophet and the Book of Isaiah is the second longest in terms of chapters (66) only beaten by the Book of Psalms (150).

I can't explain why this particular passage resonated with me, but it sort of felt like God reassuring me that He won't give up on me.

I am told to seek God and call upon Him, and that He will richly pardon those who have mercy.

The canticle reminds us that although God's thoughts and ways are higher than ours, nevertheless he provides for us.

The rain and snow come down and cannot return from whence they came, but they water the earth, helping seeds to grow, making crops grow and providing us with our daily bread.

I think perhaps the last two verses are what really made me think. God's word will not return to Him fruitless, but will accomplish the purpose he gave it, and succeed in its task.

The task of God's word is to inform, instruct and inspire and I think I can safely say, this canticle did that for me.



The Best Sermons are Lived....

Today, I interviewed my grandmother for part of a research paper I'm working on for my Psychology class. When I asked her to define success in her own words, she said, "Success is when you look back at your life and the memories make you smile."

Today, I asked my mentor—a very successful business man in his 70's—what his top 3 tips are for success. He smiled and said, "Read something no one else is reading think something no one else is thinking, and do something no one else is doing."

Today, after a 72 hour shift at the fire station, a woman ran up to me at the grocery store and gave me a hug. When I tensed up, she realized I didn't recognize her. She let go with tears of joy in her eyes and the most sincere smile and said, "On 9-11-2001, you carried me out of the World Trade Center."

Today, after I watched my dog get run over by a car, I sat on the side of the road holding him and crying. And just before he died, he licked the tears off my face.

Today at 7.00am, I woke up feeling ill, but decided I needed the money, so I went into work. At 3.00pm I got laid off. On my drive home I got a flat tire. When I went into the trunk for the spare it was flat too. A man in a BMW pulled over, gave me a ride, we chatted, and then he offered me a job. I start tomorrow.

Today, as my father, three brothers and two sisters stood around my mother's hospital bed, my mother uttered her last coherent words before she died. She simply said, "I feel so loved right now. We should have gotten together like this more often."

Today, I kissed my dad on the forehead as he passed away in a small hospital bed. About 5 seconds after he passed, I realized it was the first time I had given him a kiss since I was a little boy.


